Here is the latest on the Roundup. We have registration forms available on the Area 40 website (aa-montana.org). We are open for early registration, so please tell your home group folks to download the form (separate form for each person attending) and mail in a check to the address provided on the form. The early Registration fee for the event is \$30, which increases to \$35 on February 1, 2020.

Our 2020 Roundup website is still under development and should be live in mid-October. At that time, you may also register electronically. Please be advised that our ticketing vendor, Eventbrite, adds a convenience fee to the registration cost so you will actually save a little money by mailing in your registration.

From a program perspective, thank you to all of those groups who volunteered to host a meeting or participate in a workshop/panel. I believe we are in good shape, and hope to have an early draft of our program available before yearend.

September 2020 DCM Report

GSRs were asked to confirm that the info (GSR name and contact info, meeting time and location, etc.) on their group's "Group Information Form" is current. If not, they were asked to take a minute to fill out a change form after the meeting.

I attended a workshop on performing a District inventory at the Regional Forum. I received a list of potential questions that could be asked during such an inventory, and I think it may be beneficial for the District to try to answer these questions. The list of potential questions was distributed, and a copy is attached to this month's minutes. GSRs were asked to talk to their groups about whether performing an inventory would be a good use of District's time. We will vote on whether to do the inventory at the October business meeting.

I attended the fall Area Assembly a few weeks ago. A copy of the Area financial report will be attached to this month's minutes. If anyone would like to know the outcome of any of the voting issues, let me know.

One issue that I understand comes up often at Area is whether the assemblies should always be held in Great Falls. There was much discussion about this at the assembly, and it was rather contentious. A decision was made to stick with Great Falls for now, until a motion to change the location is made and passed at a future Area Assembly. According to a report presented at the Assembly, roughly 75% of the members of Area 40 would like to see the location of the assemblies rotate around the state. For this reason, I think that Area may be willing to approve a new location if a viable and economical alternative is presented. Therefore, I'd like to form a committee to investigate whether we can find a location in District 72 that can match or beat the costs of the Holiday Inn in Great Falls. If we can, perhaps we will decide as a district to propose that location for the Fall Assembly in 2021 by bringing a motion at the Spring Area Assembly. Anyone interested in joining this committee, please let me know.

I was asked to give a report at Area on what it was like to attend my first Regional Forum in August. A copy of the report I gave is attached to this month's minutes.

12. What activities should the District do to encourage cooperation with the professional community- the physicians, clergy, court officials, educators and others who are often the first to see alcoholics in need of help? Where can we be more effective?

13. How is the District doing in fulfilling financial responsibilities as it relates to group contributions? How can we be better?

14. What current structures within the District are not necessary or effective?

15. How effectively is the District applying the "12 Concepts" in its operation? If not, what could be done to change that?

16. How effectively is the District applying the "12 Traditions" in its operation? If not, what can be done to change that?

17. What role, if any, does the District play in the unity of the A.A. community as a whole? How could it be more effective?

18. Are there any concerns or issues not addressed in the previous questions? If so, please list them.

First-Time Attendee's Report on the Regional Forum

My name is Lisa, I'm an alcoholic. I'm the DCM from District 72, and my home group is There Is a Solution in Bozeman.

Last month, I had the opportunity to attend my first Regional Forum. When the opportunity was presented to me, the first thing I did was try to make my alternate DCM go instead. I asked Steven to pinch hit for me, because the forum was scheduled for the same weekend I was supposed to move. But he already had plans to visit Banff that weekend with his girlfriend. He decided not to trade Banff for Grand Forks, ND, or the company of his girlfriend for a bunch of alcoholics. So off I went to my first Regional Forum.

When I arrived on Friday afternoon, I headed to the ballroom where most of the weekend's activities were slated to occur. One of the sights that greeted me was a table containing copies of the Big Book in 71 languages. It's one thing to know that the BB is available in that many languages. It's quite another to see all the copies of that beautiful and lifesaving book laid out in front of you, to touch the Braille copy, to think of all the hands that will be able to hold it in their native language. This is possible because of the efforts of those who serve "down the triangle," some of whom I would get to meet during the days that followed. Like the big AA dork that I am, I took pictures of the display table on my phone and sent them off to my friends and family. The weekend was off to a powerful and memorable start.

Thanks to the organizational efforts of our Regional Trustee Tom and our Delegate Paul, I had the opportunity to share meals with Michele Grinberg, a Class A non-alcoholic Trustee and the current Chair of the AA Board of Trustees, and Christine Carpenter, another non-alcoholic Trustee and one of the two that will be visiting Montana in a few weeks. During the forum, I developed a much greater appreciation for the trustees. Year after year, they make tremendous investments of time and effort in order to help AA reach literally anyone, literally anywhere who is reaching out for help and to ensure that AA stays strong for generations to come. It's a beautiful and inspiring thing that so many who have experienced the miracle of recovery firsthand are willing to serve in that capacity, but it truly blows my mind that there are gifted and accomplished non-alcoholics who are willing to make that same investment! We are not saints, but I'm pretty sure that they are.

I'd like to share one thought that recurred throughout my time at the Regional Forum, which is how having service positions in AA, at any and every level, can help us survive and stay sober when life becomes harder than we ever thought it could be. This train of thought was sparked when one of the trustees talked about how she started her position soon after her son died while serving in Iraq. She spoke movingly about how service tethered her to AA at a time when she most desperately needed it. Her message really hit home for me. At this time last year, I unwittingly became a DCM just a few weeks before first one teenage daughter and then the other became seriously ill with chronic conditions that have taken us all over the country this year to get them the care they

need. To be honest, many of my usually good AA habits have fallen by the wayside during the last 12 months. But the one thing that I've continued to show up for is for my obligations as DCM. I'd like to attribute that to spiritual fitness, but in truth, I've shown up because (a) people will notice if I don't, and (b) I can't make the alt DCM Steven do everything, no matter how sorely I am sometimes tempted to try.

During the past twelve months, when the grief and chaos caused by my daughters' suffering has caused me to drift away from AA, being a DCM has anchored me. Weekends at regional and area conferences are where I have found connection to my higher power and my fellows, which has eluded me most everywhere else. Weekends like the Forum and Area are respites, where I get to reflect on what I can do, what I can learn, who I can emulate in order to serve my District to the very best of my ability. That is something I can control, and when my thoughts and actions are moving in that direction, despair recedes and I feel inspired. Knowing that I can reliably find that feeling in service, even when everything else feels impossible, is a profound gift.

Because I attended the Forum, my family rescheduled our move for one week later. It all went just fine, because eight members of our AA family and their kids showed up to help. The DCM who served District 72 before me told me that attending the Forum would be a highlight of my term, and he wasn't kidding. I'm so glad that I got to go, and I'm grateful for the opportunity to describe the experience to all of you.
